A grade of C, D, F, or I in this class may negatively affect TELS eligibility. Dropping a class after 14 days may also affect eligibility. ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

Plagiarism, cheating, fabrication, or facilitating any such act. For purposes of this section, the following definition applies:

- 1. Plagiarism: The adoption or reproduction of ideas, words, statements, images, or works of another person as one's own without proper attribution. This includes self-plagiarism, which occurs when author submits material or research from a previous academic exercise to satisfy the requirements of another exercise and uses it without proper citation of its reuse.
- 2. Cheating: Using or attempting to use unauthorized materials, information, or study aids in any academic exercise. This includes unapproved collaboration, which occurs when a student works with others on an academic exercise without the express permission of the professor. The term academic exercise includes all forms of work submitted for credit or hours.
- 3. Fabrication: Unauthorized falsification or invention of any information or citation in an academic exercise.

Any case of academic misconduct will be reported to the Officer of Academic Affairs for violating the academic honesty requirements in the student handbook.
